#### Main Objections

## 1) Impact on Birdlife-

- Only 3.6km from the only known breeding colony of Taiko. Birds are attracted to light and
  if grounded are likely to be injured and die. Light will spill out of the pits and will attract
  the birds. In my opinion mining should not continue during the time Taiko are
  active. This would fully eliminate the risk to the birds.
- There are 10 vulnerable, at risk and declining species also in the area or the adjacent potential SNA PUN-W034.

#### 2) Noise levels-

- At my location—sources sound bounces off the hills on the eastern side increasing the decibel level if it was measured near the road. This area was not covered by the acoustic report.
- FROM TIGA website: Truck movements associated with removal of heavy mineral concentrate to and from the south of the site (towards Greymouth) must be limited to 50 per day and five per hour (both averaged over a one week period) between the hours of 5am and 10pm.
- Up to 5 truck movements per hour past my place will result in an appreciable increase in noise levels as human ears do not average sound out. Note the graph below which clearly shows maximum noise levels are regularly already over 75dB- in fact the tops of the max levels in light grey are not even shown so we are left to guess how high they actually go. This noise is set to continue from 5am in the morning until 10am at night 7 days per week. That is 1 truck movement every 12 minutes.




Figure 3: Average time history noise logger data at Position 1 during suitable weather conditions


This will negatively impact the peace and quiet I came here for as well as seriously affect the accommodation business I am in the process of setting up.

I have also talked to neighbours who are already talking about moving as this due to
their concerns re noise- the milk tankers are already so loud but at least do not run for
the whole year and are not running all day.

### 3) Road safety issues-

- The already damaged state of the surface of the road. How often will this be fixed and who pays for it? This will increase the vibration and hence noise levels.
- An increase in slip activity is likely due to the greater vibration caused by the increase in large heavy trucks using the road. This will negatively impact everyone using the road and have flow on effects to businesses whose staff would unable to get to work
- The suggestion of TIGA to limit truck travel times around school pick up and drop off times will only increase noise levels and congestion at other times.
- Problems with tourists who are unfamiliar with the road, often stopping on the road to
  take photos or not pulling over when driving extremely slowly or unsafely for our
  conditions. Tourist numbers are predicted to return to post covid levels within the next
  few years and may increase due to numbers of national tourists increasing. See the
  graph below presented by Bjoern Spreitzer fromTourism New Zealand at the 2023 West
  Coast Tourism Summit.

- 5) Coastal Inundation- I am concerned that there is no clear detail about how the ground level is going to be maintained. TIGA has only said they will maintain this level close to the sea. There has been no clear plan about how the material that has been removed-(which will be appreciable over a 5 year period 25 truckload per day) will be replaced. Without replacing material the level will end up being below sea level which could cause possible coastal inundation, salt water leaching inland and the formation of lakes- which has not been discussed.
- 6) Breaches District plan Is not in keeping with the Resource management act (see below) and District plan where new activities should not adversely affect existing accommodation/ tourism businesses, home and land owners and avian species. Is also not in keeping with the government's No new mines stance.

# Note to submitter

If you are making a submission to the Environmental Protection Authority, you should use form 16B.

The closing date for serving submissions on the consent authority is the 20th working day after the date on which public or limited notification is given. If the application is subject to limited notification, the consent authority may adopt an earlier closing date for submissions once the consent authority receives responses from all affected persons.
