Note to submitter

If you are making a submission to the Environmental Protection Authority, you should use form 16B.

The closing date for serving submissions on the consent authority is the 20th working day after the date on which public or limited notification is given. If the application is subject to limited notification, the consent authority may adopt an earlier closing date for submissions once the consent authority receives responses from all affected persons.

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Adverse effects include:

- 1. The operation of this mine will degrade the local environment and lessen its growing appeal to both tourists and to the growing number of people from outside the region coming to live on the Coast Road for lifestyle reasons, and to pursue tourism-related economic activities.
- 2. The effects of the proposed large number of heavy truck movements and their heavy loads will impact the lives of residents, degrade the tourist experience, and cause delay to business people such as myself who regularly travel between Greymouth and Westport.
- 3. Likewise the heavy vehicle movements will degrade the road, which is built on land that is geologically recent, subject already to slips that require ongoing maintenance, and which are subject to road closures following extreme weather events. The ongoing effects of climate change are yet to come...
- 4. TIGA's application proposes a venture that is speculative in nature. Its capital base is minor, and its experience is limited. Should the application be granted, the company could be on-sold to anyone here or overseas. Rare earth minerals are (rare), they are subject to scrambling to secure these by the great powers and others. They are valuable national resources not to be given away for a limited number of truck driving jobs.
- 5. I am not anti-mining and come from a 5th generation West Coast family who in the past have had involvement with gold-mining ventures. In the course of my professional life I have a good understanding of West Coast businesses. I support looking behind these types of ventures and asking "what's in it for us?" Benefits claimed are often unrealised, and downstream consequences can end up being a burden for future generations.

- 6. Of particular concern is that other countries such as Australia impose regulation on the mining of ilmenite, in particular, and further that the effect of mining produces radioactive by-product that is hazardous. This is a relevant consideration that needs to be investigated, so that the applicant's views on this can be scrutinised by expert international professionals.
- 7. What will the effect of large-scale strip mining projects like this be on our tourism industry? "You can't have your cake and eat it too". We claim the West Coast is "Untamed Natural Wilderness", yet this mining proposal is sought for an area right in the heart of one of the West Coast's tourist gems! Tourists especially the young ones see through double standards easily, and word gets around.
- 8. (Finally) We live in a world, and in a region where we are increasingly exposed to the huge cost of dealing with climate change and its impact on our environment. The costs of this will impact on local communities increasingly. Even without considering the impact of TIGA's heavy vehicles on the road, how long will the Coast Road itself be viable in the face of sea level rise and increasingly severe weather events? Councils need to be thinking of these effects for future generations.
